CLOISTER WINS NATIONAL "AWARD"



MARK TWAIN first saw the light of a Missouri day November 30, 1835. Buffalo has a good claim on Mark Twain alongside Hannibal, Elmira, Hartford and New York City as a place where, for however short a time, the celebrated humorist worked, suffered, joked, unstuffed stuffed shirts, and exploded all sham balloons that floated his way. He came to Buffalo, Saturday, August 14, 1869 to run the Express for J. N. Larned, George H. Sel kirk, himself and others who had bought out the Clapp Brothers and Thomas Kennett. The staff gave him a dinner that night and Monday he got down to business. His Buffalo sojourn ended in April 1871, when sorely tried by a winter of sickness and death in his family, he gave up his interest in the Express — in fact, gave up newspaper work altogether.

It has been said frequently that on the whole, Mark Twain's two years in Buffalo did not leave a favorable impression in the humorist's mind. There was nothing about the City which made him unhappy here, but the constant misfortune which overtook his family. Mr. Langdon, the father of his bride, Olivia Langdon died in 1870.

Also that summer, a friend of Mrs. Clemens came to visit them at 472 Delaware Avenue and was stricken with typhoid fever. The friend died in the Twain house about six weeks after Mr. Langdon died in Elm'ra. Another death, that of a Washington newspaperman named Riley, with whom Twain was going to write a book, occurred a month after the friend of Mrs. Clemens died. But the greatest disaster which came to him and his family came two weeks later when his first child was prematurely born.

Mrs. Clemens, exhausted by the tragedies of the previous four months, almost died from the shock. He sold out his share of the Express in April 1871 and went to Elmira to re-order his life.

Clemens, aboard a trans-Atlantic Steamer, the "Quaker City," eventually led to a formal introduction to Olivia and her marriage to "Mark Twain." He epitomized his love idyll with the loveliest, the gentlest and the kindest person he had ever met with these words: "Wheresoever she was, there was Eden."

472 DELAWARE AVENUE, Mark Twain's Buffalo residence, to which he brought his bride, Olivia Langdon of Elmira. The mansion stood on the west side of Delaware Avenue, just north of Virginia Street. Friends liked to recall the time Mark Twain moved with his wife, Olivia, to their home at 472 Delaware Avenue. Mark Twain didn't know a great deal about Buffalo real estate so he commissioned Mr. Slee of Elmira to find him a modest boarding place. Mr. Slee said he would make the search forthwith and Mark Twain accordingly forgot about the whole matter until the afternoon of February 3rd, 1870 when he came from Elmira with his bride. The couple was met at the station and then slowly and aimlessly driven to 472 Delaware Avenue where Mark Twain soon was to be flabbergasted by the an-nouncement that the "modest lodgings" he had asked for was this fine house and that it was the present of Mr. Langdon to his daughter and son-in-law. When Mark Twain regained his composure he remarked to Mr. Langdon, "Whenever you are in Buffalo, if it's twice a year, come right here. Bring your bag and stay overnight, if you want to. It shan't cost you a cent."

Inspired, a French soldier in the group declared a toast: "Vive le Cog's tail!" Thus a legend began. New Orleans version: An early apothecary on the waterfront served liquor to sailors in "coquetiers" or eggcups. (There are many legends of the cocktail—and other drinks as well. In fact, there are SO many, we can offer here only a few of the fascinating, contradictory tales!)

MANHATTAN

In Maryland, in 1846, a local bartender rushed a drink to a wounded duelist. He filled a stemmed glass half full of rye, syrup and bitters. The drink grew popular, and vermouth was added, in "Gay 90's" New York where it became known as the "Manhattan."

MARTINI

This drink was first made at the Waldorf-Astoria in New York, in the "Gay 90's." And it was named after a Mr. Marti-nez of New Orleans for whom it was made.

HIGHBALL

St. Louis, 1880's: Early rail-roaders used a ball on a high pole to signal an engineer to speed up. This was called a highball. The trainmen, always on a fast schedule, only had time to have a quick drink . . . which usually was whiskey and water .They named it the "highball."

OLD-FASHIONED

One of America's oldest, this cocktail was created on Ken tucky Derby Day at Louis-ville's Pendennis Club. The "mix" has changed many times. Fruit was added during Prohibition, to hide the taste of that era's poor liquor.

Exterior Of The Cloister

The Cloister Green House

THE CLOISTER welcomes you to a story book journey back into the elegant era of the gay and fascinating "Nineties" with its days of lavish living, courtly manners and romantic history. Your first approach to the Cloister is one of subdued amazement and enchantment at the vision of the exterior with its ancient brick walls and antique iron grills lighted by gas lamps that once graced the boulevards of old Baltimore. Here you will dine in an atmosphere of quietness and leisurely enjoyment only a few steps from the hustle and bustle of downtown Buffalo and within the walls of the honeymoon home once occupied by Samuel Clemens, world famous as "Mark Twain" and his lovely bride, Olivia Louisa, in the year 1870. The Cloister has been completely and lavishly restored to its former place of beauty. Its furnishings provide an authentic air of elegance emphasized by the beautiful century old patina of the original brick walls.

May we have the privilege of taking you on a tour through our "home" as you prepare to enter . . .

The Cloister is a lovely structure of century-old hand made bricks, with wrought iron galleries against great slabs of

stone all salvaged from the ori-ginal Mark Twain Home, and nestled in a matchless setting of elm, sycamore and poplar trees, climbing ivy, banks of flowers and fine boxwood. As you prepare to enter, your first impression is the modernistic fountain, an original creation by a famed sculptress designed to contrast the new with the old. The outward atmosphere is an The outward atmosphere is an introduction to a bygone era emphasized even more by the interior with authentic furnishings for you to enjoy to the fullest. The ancient door studded with hand-wrough Spanish Clavos and its intricate hand cast brass handles is your passport to the world of make believe. The foyer, with its old ship lan-tern, and its exquisite leaded glass walls, is decorated with theatrical posters of long ago. Here you walk on hand made tiles from Mexico combined with planking salvaged from the original building. To the romanticist it is pleasant to imagine that you are for a moment transplanted to the fabulous era of Mark Twain and his contemporaries. The sunken living room to your right is built in the basement of the original home erected in 1811 and the old foundations still remain, now covered with love seats along its walls. The vaulted beamed ceiling is traditional of the Clois

ters which were known for centuries as places where men might meet and enjoy the undisturbed fellowship of good companions. To your left is our companion lounge with its century-old hand carved oak fireplace exquisitely furnished to put you in a mood of relaxation and contentment so you may more fully enjoy the gourmet foods our staff will prepare and serve to you.

Look about you as you dine
... enjoy the brilliant colors
and designs of the Tiffany
Chandeliers hung in the dining
room which formerly was the
carriage house and stables,
the conservatory of glass with
its outside gardens centered
around an old wine press and
exquisite stone statuary imported from the capitals of Europe.
When darkness falls there is a
gradual transformation of these
rooms into a fairyland of soft
colors and enchantment.

The rear exit is marked by a globe which for years was a part of the old Buffalo Library, the crank handled telephone dated 1903 and the four blade circulating ceiling fans from the back hills of Arkansas. The unusual hand-carved furniture from Old Mexico graces the dining rooms and living room lounges. The century old tech-

niques employed in its making have remained unchanged since the conquest of Mexico by the great Spanish Conquistador Hernando Cortes. Imperfections resulting from these primitive methods are hallmarks of authenticity and the painting technique used originated during the Renaissance. No two pieces are identical and each is an individually made work of art by descendants of the Aztec and Toltec Indians of Mexico. 


